# Raising Awareness... What is Art?

If you ask 100 people "what is art?" there's a good chance you will get 100 different answers. The opportunity to explore this question came to life this fall in an exciting collaboration with Forward Theater Company in Madison.

Forward Thearer's presentation of John Logan's Tony award-winning play *Red*, depicts the life of abstract expressionist painter Mark Rothko. The story challenges perceptions and raises awareness about art and the creative process. Sound familiar? That's exactly what VSA Wisconsin does.

This collaboration with Forward Theater inspired us to think outside the box. We challenged the teaching artists at the art center to use the theme *What Is Art?* in their classes. Excitedly, they implemented new ideas for individual and collaborative art making that hadn't been tried before. One teaching



artist projected images of work by famous artists. After viewing a Kandinsky, one particpant, who had previously only drawn cats, drew something entirely different, and with complementary colors. Another participant, who has a very short



attention span, finished an entire project and proudly pointed out shapes in his storybooks -- a new accomplishment for him. In a music and movement class, participants viewed a video of a flash mob dancing in an airport which inspired them to learn the art of swing dancing. Participants in a ceramics class created self portrait masks and animals, exploring art within themselves and through nature.

Original visual artworks created in the classes along with pictorial images of music and movement classes are now on view at the VSA Wisconsin gallery through April 10. Hours are Monday-Thursday 9 am-3 pm or by appointment. Please join us in exploring creative expression and the relationship between art and viewer.

# **Art Center**



Visual art is a very important part of Casey's DeZonia's life. He likes expressing his creativity by building pottery, 3-D projects, and oil pastel drawings. thunder tubes, duck guiros, and sandblocks were used to increase enthusiasm and allow for a sense of accomplishment mastering a new skill. Some activities were tied to curriculum topics, furthering experiences in another area. Movement activities allowed experiences with wands and scarves. They also incorporated stop-start elements giving practice in impulse control and motor planning.

One very shy child in a creative drama residency initially would not speak and only responded to yes and no questions by shaking his head. He showed great interest when the teaching artist arrived and by the third session he began to actively participate in the activities. Soon



he began to utter single words and now he answers questions when they are asked of the group. The student is starting to open up during the school day and the teacher says she is sure that it is in direct correlation with his positive experience during the residency.

# Choirs

Almost 200 people with disabilities participate in the statewide choir program. Choir members learn about pitch, tone, rhythm, movement, basic music history and composition and share their accomplishments through public performances.

Each semester the Madison choir learns one new song that is particularly complex and challenges the group to expand



they mastered "Carol of the Bells," a three-part round, as well as "Zum Gali Gali" and the "Banana Boat Song." Members of the Stoughton choir are using rhythm instruments as they sing and also are given a chance to lead songs with the director. In addition to new musical accomplishments, choir members are also demonstrating increased self confidence and social skills. Hazel\* was previously quite withdrawn, but now interacts with others more, giving "high 5's", and coming up to the front to perform in a group. Sissy\* is very helpful in passing out instruments without being asked, as well as helping to put them away. She is also a leader with the drums and other instruments.

Over the years, many of her students have received purchase awards or recognition awards resulting from this program and it has given them great validation as artists. Not only are the students gaining pride and self confidence in their art endeavors, some now consider art as a viable career opportunity. Many are continuing to keep art as a focal point in their lives. She says, "Regardless of the countless outcomes, the experience itself is priceless!"

VSA Day is an annual performance opportunity for individuals with disabilities to showcase their musical accomplishments at a UW Badger football game. VSA Wisconsin choir members from Stevens Point and Wisconsin Rapids signed



the National Anthem and students from Medford, DeForest, Belmont and Tomah performed with the UW Marching Band. Two students who attended have Autism and Down Syndrome. Both participate fully in the Tomah Marching Band program and one is also a member of the Concert Choir. Charlie O'Brien, director of instrumental music says "Their participation in the arts is one of the many

examples of how immersion into the classroom benefits everyone involved. The arts are an

important part of their lives and your event reinforces how music should be available to anyone and everyone regard-

less of ability level or special needs. Thank you again for the very special event and I hope we can participate for years to come. The only thing I would change would



be to have even more students partici-

pate so they can share such a worthwhile experience. I look forward to working with you in the future and please share my sincerest thank you and praise with your organization, donors, and volunteers."

# School & Community Artist Residencies

In Wisconsin Rapids, adults with disabilities participated in a puppetry residency at the Opportunity Development Center. They created rod, hand, and mouth puppets and learned how to manipulate them for a performance. Using the music of "Carnival of the Animals" as inspiration, participants performed with their puppets before an audience of 120. According to the teaching artist, one participant was initially reluctant to lift her arms. However, the desire to hold her puppet up and move it was strong and she was ultimately able to perform this task. The participant was also non-verbal during the residency workshops, but during the final performance, her cat puppet let out a most surprising 'meow!'



A residency at Mendota Elementary School in Madison directly impacted 340 students and resulted in a large mural. In his program application, art teacher Nate Kirley wrote, "Initially, I was intrigued by VSA's philosophy of universal design in relation to teaching art; making the project accessible to everyone and implementing best practices across the board. We had so much success with VSA last year we decided to work with them again." An inclusive learning setting like Mendota Elementary School provided an environment in which children of all abilities could grow and develop, particularly as they worked side-by-side to design and complete the mural.


