Visual Expressions: A Call for Art Exhibition

Dramatic, whimsical, sophisticated, and exotic are just a few words that describe the works that were submitted to VSA Wisconsin's 2013 Call for Art. Nearly 300 artists submitted 407 two and three dimensional works and the

resulting exhibition was a kaleidoscope of color, shapes and themes. The exhibition was on view at the VSA Wisconsin Gallery in Madison from March 16 – April 10 allowing visitors ample time to enjoy the artists' creative expressions in watercolor, acrylic paint, pastel, ceramics, sculpture, photography and a variety of other mixed media.

A jury of independent arts professionals reviewed the entries and selected 10 works which were added to *Creative Power: VSA Wisconsin's Traveling Exhibition* in May. Award winning artists include: Stasia Wilson, White-water; Barb Priem, Monona; Roy Bedward and Mai Thao, Madison; Joyce Gust, Winneconne; Arianna Griffore, Green Bay; Sterling Solberg, LaCrosse; Laron Birmingham, Milwaukee; Torin Wilke, Hortonville and Bridget Kowalski, Waukegan. Ten additional works received honorable mention awards and six entries received recognition awards. A ceremony recognizing these artists was held on April 6.

The ideas and emotions expressed in the art is very powerful. A common theme among the artists . . . they love to create art for themselves and others to enjoy. Their work was inspired by other artists, heroes, pets, nature, imagination, historical figures and family.

Stasia Wilson paints subject matter that moves her emotionally. She uses art as a therapeutic outlet for herself and her viewers. The visual arts are Stasia's first passion, keeping her motivated and allowing her to cope with life's rollercoaster. She hopes her pieces communicate her deepest sorrow and her overwhelming joy of being alive.

When Roy Bedward paints, he feels more normal and happy than any other time in his life. Art is real for him, it is a way of communication and a way to show how much love is in his heart.

Mosaics, Murals and More

Life In Bloom

Nearly 100 residents and staff at Central Wisconsin Center in Madison created a beautiful mosaic mural that is now permanently installed in the gymnasium at Stevens Hall. The mosaic process is one of the most accessible art processes because it's not intimidating and doesn't require a lot of knowledge about art technique. Placing the tiles can be random, so this art medium was perfect for the individuals participating in the program. With mosaics, everyone gets a chance to create something beautiful.



Mural Transforms School Cafeteria

This spring, more than 300 students at Mendota Elementary School in Madison designed and created a 28-foot painted mural which is now installed in the school cafeteria. During the design phase, students participated in a surrealist word association game to generate unique and original imagery for the mural. Students worked in pairs and as one person read a word that related to school, his/her partner said the first thing that came to mind. After the students played the game, they were asked to circle a pair of words that popped out at them the most. These words were then used as the inspiration for a 15-minute drawing session which led to the master mural design.



Full Circle - The Art of Acceptance

Students with disabilities at Hamilton, Wauwatosa, Whitnall, Franklin and Riverside University High Schools explored the theme of understanding, respect, compassion and acceptance while participating in a VSA Wisconsin artist residency this year. As they learned the art of mosaics, the students used mathematical concepts associated with patterns and also learned about concepts such as symmetrical destiny, border, and choosing images or shapes that have meaning. The final designs were exhibited at Alverno College in May.



Book Arts

Students at Golda Meir School in Milwaukee created scrolls and explored the use of mosaics in ancient cultures. They made paper mosaic covers for the books that they were creating. This collage project was very successful and had a positive impact on one student who seemed to get in trouble nearly every day. By the fourth class, he was on task most of the time enjoying the projects and the information about Greece and the Greek language. The teaching artist said, "I think it made him want to remain in class."
